On call of Julian A. Wolfson, chairman for the Philippines, assisted by Benito Lopez, 38 Michigan

alumni met in Manila to hear the story of the University's plans for an atomic research center dedicated to its war dead. Every alumnus present signed a pledge to give a minimum of \$100 over the three-year period of payment, and one who was unable to attend sent in his pledge.

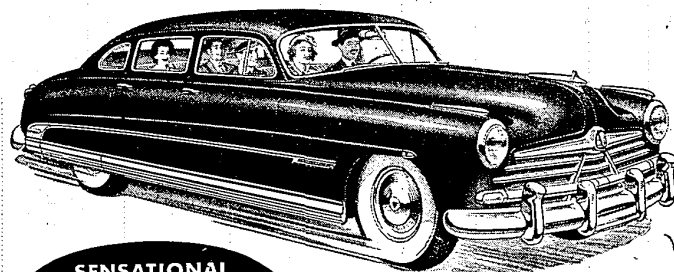
