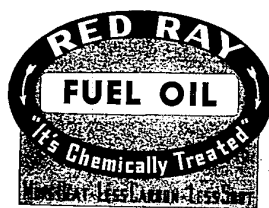

Orro moved quietly onto the East Lansing campus in February under the sponsorship of the Lutheran Student Association after a three-month delay at an embarkation center in Germany.

The LSA, setting on an offer from the college administration to provide free tuition to a student-supported displaced person who wished an American education, contacted Orro through overseas church agencies.

The third displaced student at Michigan State arrived too late to register for the winter quarter in January, but Registrar Robert S. Linton and department heads arranged a special "visiting" curriculum for him.

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Game Law Violations Decrease Since December

With major hunting seasons at an end and before December, conservation law violations for that month scaled downward as was expected by conservation department law enforcement officials.

Violators totaled 311 compared to 1,110 in November and 298 in December, 1948.

Hunting deer in the special antlerless season without a license attracted up 41 persons. Other major arrests were for setting untagged traps, setting traps within six feet of a hole, possession of loaded guns in cars, trapping without a license and removing Christmas trees without permit.

Violators paid \$6,929 in fines and costs and were given a total of 400 days in jail. Convictions were obtained in 294 cases. Six cases were dismissed, five resulted in not guilty judgment, and six others were incomplete.

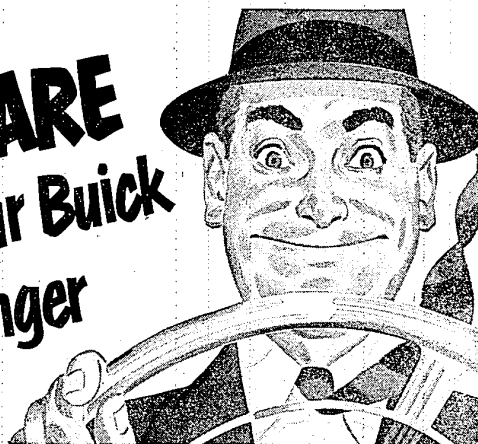
