Game Law Violations Take Farther Drop

Conservation law violations, following a regular downward trend at this time of year, were off more than 50 per cent in January.

State conservation department's law enforcement division reports 113 violators compared to 311 in December and 228 in January, 1949.

Most arrests were for fishing without a license, exceeding fish possession limits, and fishing without a boat license.

Fines and costs paid by violators amounted to only \$2,690. Convictions were obtained in 149 of the 153 cases.

Possible trend for state oil and gas exploratory drilling to move further north and/or into deeper formations is indicated by the 57,541-acre bidding for the conservation department public oil and gas lease auction at Lansing March 3.

Oil companies and independent operators have requested inclusion of nearly 25,000 acres in Crawford, Kalamazoo, Wexford and Roscommon counties in the first sale of the year. Prime interest in these counties is in the Richfield formation, deepest in the state.

High bidder interest is expected in Anable township acreage in Roscommon county, as a possible

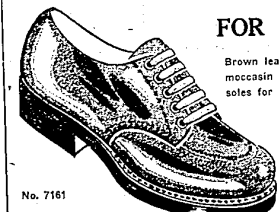
