MSC ENGINEERS SET EXPOSITION PLANS; 5,000 EXPECTED

Purpose of the annual exposition is to show the facilities of the MSC School of Engineering and the potentialities of engineering as a career.

William S. Flacus, Detroit senior and president of the student Engineering Council, has been named chairman of the 1950 Exposition.

Technical apparatus, displays and demonstrations will be provided.

Dear Mr. Tagg:
A number of people have asked me how I stand with reference to the proposed "Farmington Township Building Code", which is to be submitted at the special township election on April 17, 1950. I shall vote in favor of adopting the proposed ordinance.

Farmington Township is a fine community in which to live. It is a rapidly growing community. I understand that Farmington Township is surrounded by other townships which already have rules and regulations for their protection, such as building codes, zoning ordinances, health regulations, etc.

Our township is the last of the nearby townships which have no such regulations. It is, therefore, unprotected rural or semi-rural areas for the erection and maintenance of sub-standard homes and other buildings, unhealthy and unsafe conditions and nuisances, etc.

I have heard but two objections to the proposed ordinance. One is that Section 9 will require a certificate of occupancy, issued by the Township Clerk, certifying that the erection, alteration or repair of the building or dwelling under consideration has been consummated in accordance with the building permit and the application therefor, and that construction, plumbing and electrical work have been inspected and approved by the inspector, before a person can occupy the building or structure to be covered thereby.

That is, in essence, what a conscientious, law-abiding citizen would expect and desire. — Inasmuch as the certificate of occupancy would be for his benefit as well as for the benefit of his neighbors and others residing in the township. This objection seems to be based upon an erroneous assumption that township officials would be arbitrary in the exercise of their duties under Section 9.

Let me state that I do not intend to lay a foundation for the belief that public officers will be arbitrary or capricious. I would not expect that problem to arise. But if in the future some public official should abuse the powers reposed in him — the elective process, or the power of removal, would be the democratic and effective way of handling the matter.

The other objection to the proposed ordinance, raised by some, is that Section 2 provides that no permit shall be required for alteration or repairs to farm property — farm property being defined therein as any piece of land not less than five acres in extent. The line must be drawn somewhere, and whether it is at five acres, or ten or twenty or forty acres is a matter which can be further considered after the proposed ordinance has been adopted, and amendments made. It doesn't make sense to settle the proposed ordinance, which is of benefit to so many, because a few have objections to

Some of its provisions. Adoption of the proposed building code would assure all residents and owners in Farmington Township of certain minimum standards, — which are within the reach of the average man. Of course the provisions of an ordinance operate only as to future operations; they do not impair the rights of persons having rights already established.

Section 3 of the proposed code adopts the State Plumbing Code to govern future plumbing operations. Section 11 of the proposed code adopts the National Electrical or State Code. Both of these are carefully worked out instruments for the welfare of the people who adopt them. No one could seriously object to their adoption by the township as standards by which to measure the safety and adequacy of future building operations in Farmington Township.

The democratic process of amendment will apply take care of reasonable objections to the proposed code, when adopted. Section 12 of the code, as proposed, expressly provides for amendments. The process of amendment has often been used in the case of the Federal Constitution. Michigan's State Constitution has likewise, from time to time, been amended. No instrument, when presented, is perfect, — but that has never been a valid reason for not taking the forward step of commencing in the right direction and leaving later changes to amendment or repeal.

The future health, welfare, and safety of the people of Farmington Township should be safeguarded by adopting the proposed building code at the special election on April 17, 1950.

SCHOOLMASTERS TO HOLD 63rd ANNUAL MEETING AT U-M

Michigan school teachers and administrators will gather at the University of Michigan April 27 and 28 for the 63rd annual meeting of the Michigan Schoolmasters' Club.

About 3,000 persons are expected to attend the meetings of the Schoolmasters' Club and of several related conferences. This will include 1,000 or more high school students coming to the University campus for the annual state championship debate of the Michigan High School Forensic Association.

Contestants will be Plymouth High School and Albion High School.

The University will hold its annual Honors Convocation on April 28, and members of the Schoolmasters' Club are invited to attend this program honoring students of high scholastic achievement. The speaker will be Dr. William Samuel Carlson, president of the University of Delaware and president-elect of the University of Vermont.

Three specialized conferences on educational matters will be held in conjunction with the Schoolmasters' meeting. These will be conferences on problems in school and college cooperation, on teacher education, and teacher supply and demand.

At the latter conference, the principal speaker will be Dr. Earl J. McGrath, United States Commissioner of Education.

Theme for the Schoolmasters' programs will be "gladly learning, gladly teaching". The sessions will open with a general assembly on Friday morning, April 28, with Philip Lovejoy, secretary of the International Rotary Club, Chicago, as the main speaker. Another general session will follow the Club's annual dinner that night.

The speaker will be Preston Bradley, pastor of People's Church in Chicago. The remainder of the program will be devoted to a series of group conferences on special teaching areas, such as art, science, social studies, and mathematics.

Plant 200,000 Trout For Season Opening

By the time trout season opens April 29 the conservation department hopes to have released some 200,000 legal-size trout principally in upstate lakes and streams.

About 90,000 sportsmen purchased trout stamps by opening day last season, most of whom went to action opening week end. More than 175,000 stamps were purchased in 1949.

To get a good start on approaching the planting goal reached last year — 1,000,000 legal-size trout — fish crews again will need the help of the weatherman in keeping backwoods roads passable for the planting trucks. Crews liberated some 2,052,000 legal-size, sub-legal and fingerling trout in 1949.

A few 1950 plantings already have been made in southern Michigan. If roads are not too soft in the next few weeks, fish crews should come close to duplicating the 1949 preseason legal-size release of approximately 101,000 brook, 79,000 rainbow and 55,000 brown trout.
