

**WIDE VARIETY OF CALLS RECEIVED BY STATE POLICE**

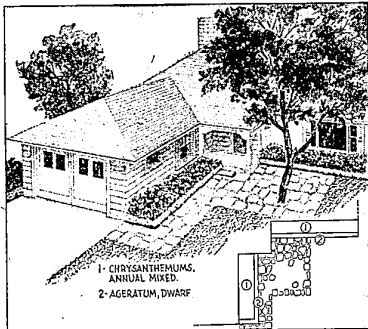
The Michigan State Police last year received a total of 67,350 complaints including everything from homicide to empty can bins. However, not all involved arrests or prosecutions; more than 18,000 were closed by "service rendered." These were cases of a non-criminal nature such as searches for lost persons, emergency rescues, delivering emergency messages, administering first aid and other services. So far this year about 4,000 complaints have been closed without the use of handcuffs, warrants, sirens, microscopes or other tools of the law enforcement officer's trade. On one occasion officers located the residence of a woman living in Canada by tracing through a letter that was written over 75 years ago. One trooper turned furnace repairman when a family with several small children reported that their oil furnace went out and they were unable to locate anyone to fix it. On another occasion two officers rescued a dog that had fallen thru the top of an elevator.

There is no set time during the day or night when the troopers respond to calls for assistance. Recently a woman called one of the posts in the southern part of the state at three in the morning. There was a rat in the house and she wanted the officers to dispose of it. One of the most unusual complaints thus far in 1950 was received at the Flat Rock post. A man called to ask if someone would take his wife to the hospital. He was unable to get a taxi and could not afford to hire an ambulance. The wife was expecting a baby.

Troopers Harold A. Ernst and Jack G. Murdoch rushed to the home only to find it was too late to attempt a race with the stork. Trooper Ernst delivered the baby with the aid of a grandmother while Trooper Murdoch located a doctor. Both the mother and new baby girl were doing nicely when the officers left to answer another call, providing a breaking and entering or even a mooning. The state trooper spent hours of questioning, searches, identifications, and subsequently, arrests.

But then, maybe it was just one of those complaints that are closed with the simple, laconic phrase on the officer's report, "service rendered."

**Garden Editor Calls For More Dooryard Gardens**

"What we need is more dooryard gardens," is the title of an article in February Home Garden Magazine, by Editor Ralph Bailey, nationally known garden writer. "What with the arrival of the garage doors at the street front of our houses and the acceptance of the picture window with the picture of only the passery by the nostalgic dooryard garden of our grandmother's day merits rediscovery," he begins. "The modern fashion of garages close to the street 'makes sense,' he continues, but: 'Replace the balanced, almost symmetrical facade of tradition with one gigantic window, as now seems to be the thing to do, and what's left of the entrance yard becomes suddenly insignificant. So, too, does the window itself unless something rather special is done about it.'"

Mr. Bailey supports the solution of the front yard problem which has been gaining favor throughout the country—the development of an attractive garden planting in the front yard. "What about the dooryard garden?" he writes. "What can it do to help the situation? For one thing, a proper garden, as opposed to just a row of shrubs and trees along the house front, can shut off
