Dairymen Adopt New Sales Plan

With income from milk sliding downward despite government price supports, dairy farmers across the nation have agreed to step up their advertising program in an all-out drive to bring consumption of dairy foods in line with heavy production. So declared B. F. Beach, manager, Michigan Producers Dairy, Ad-ri-an, upon his return from the 11th annual meeting of the American Dairy Association in Chicago, where he was re-elected to represent the dairy producers of this state on the ADA executive committee.

He reports that dairy delegates from 40 states planned a record-breaking A D A Advertising Set-aside in June Dairy Month of one cent a pound butterfat from farmers' milk and cream checks. This is urgently needed to provide a trading with a comprehensive advertising campaign next year, he explained.

The new expanded advertising program is scheduled to get underway in 1951. In some states, explained Mr. Beach, increased set-asides will be made this year because of emergencies existing nationally and locally.

Other delegates from Michigan elected to the national ADA board of directors are Fred Walker of Carson City and C. L. Reynolds of Plover, Wis. Also in attendance at the national dairy rally in Chicago were the following dairymen from Michigan: Bruce F. Clothier, North Branch; Charles Simon, Remus; and Charles E. Stone, Lansing.

WARM WEATHER TRAFFIC DANGER TIME FOR CHILDREN

With the advent of warmer weather and longer days, State Police Commissioner Donald S. Leonard is seeking the cooperation of all motorists to hold the line against the upward increase in child pedestrian and bicycle accidents at this time of the year.

"April and May are dangerous months for children," Leonard said. "Because of the many outdoor activities that spring affords, the child's mind is far from traffic safety.

"Last year more than 6500 children under 15 years of age were killed or injured in Michigan traffic accidents. Over two-thirds of these deaths and injuries resulted from child pedestrian and bicycle accidents. There was a sharp increase during the spring months.

"The most traffic accidents, tragedies of this kind can be avoided. True, the child is more often at fault than the motorist, but children are unpredictable and drivers should assume responsibility for them.

"Many young lives can be saved if everyone will remember that all streets, driveways, corners, vacant lots and other areas where children might be are danger zones."
