The precise size and location of the land will be determined until after the election May 8. The election, to be held within the school district, will decide whether or not the district will be authorized to levy an additional tax of one mill for two years to raise the

funds necessary for construction of the field.
First estimates of the costs, arrived at by comparing prices of similar fields, indicate \$11,600 to \$19,000 would be necessary to get the field into operation. The price includes fencing, lighting, grading, the field, and renting seating facilities. The tax increase would raise about \$20,000.

SPECIAL MEETING OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON
Held April 27, 1950, at 1:15 p.m.
Resolution offered by Loomis and supported by Hatton that the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, a Municipal Corporation, enter into a lease agreement with the Township School District of Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, a Municipal Corporation, whereby the said City shall lease to the said School District the following piece or parcel of land located in the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, more particularly described as follows:

Ten acres, more or less, located in the west 1/4 of that part of the following described property lying south of the south line of the Farmington Cut-Off Road, beginning at the South 1/4 corner of Section 28, thence east on said south line of Section 28 to the south-west corner of "Assessor's Plot No. 1", thence North on west line of said plot and extension of same to the East and West line to the Center of Section 28, thence South on the 1/4 line to the point of beginning — containing 38 acres.
The exact location to be determined by a survey that shall be mutually satisfactory to the contracting parties.
Said lease when executed shall be for a period of 10 years with option to renew or purchase at any time from and after the date of execution and shall require an annual rental of one dollar. It is further understood that the said school district will use said land as an athletic field and will at its expense immediately upon the execution of the lease, proceed to develop said land as an athletic field for the summer that shall be reasonably comparable to other athletic fields operated by school districts in the State of Michigan. It is further understood that the said school district is calling a special election for the purpose of authorizing the expenditure of additional millage to raise additional funds which shall be especially earmarked for the improvements of said athletic field and should the qualified electors of said school district fail to authorize such additional millage then this resolution shall be void and of no further force and effect.
