Dear Sir:

I subscribed — or I should say my Mother subscribed for the Farmington Enterprise to be sent to me. I enjoyed my first copy very much. It helps me keep up with the news back home. I have not been keeping up with the news very much since I left the States in January of 1950. I am now on an extended cruise of the Mediterranean Area.

I have lived in Farmington all my life. I joined the Navy the 7th of July 1949 and underwent training at Great Lakes, Illinois. I was then transferred to Norfolk, Virginia, and to the USS Midway. I took a cruise in the Northern Atlantic and crossed the Arctic Circle the 12th of November of 1949.

I then left for Europe the 6th of January for a five month cruise which will return to the States the 23rd of May, 1950.

Among the ports I have visited are — Gibraltar, B.C.C.; Augusta, Sicily; Naples, Italy; Sfax, Tunisia; Cyprus, Greece; Istanbul, Turkey; Suda Bay, Crete; Leghorn, Italy; and Malta, B.C.C. where I am now.

Among the ports I have yet to visit are Palermo, Sicily; Naples, Italy; Cannes, France; Oran, Africa; Gibraltar, B.C.C.; and then back to good old United States of America.

I am now serving aboard the USS Midway (CVB-41) the biggest aircraft carrier in the Atlantic Fleet. I work in the Executive Officer's Office as a yeoman. I received my training for this kind of work from Miss Bannard and Miss Rowe of Farmington High School.
