The ceremonies, held June 14, took place at Masonic Temple, for the largest graduating class in the history of the University.

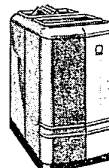

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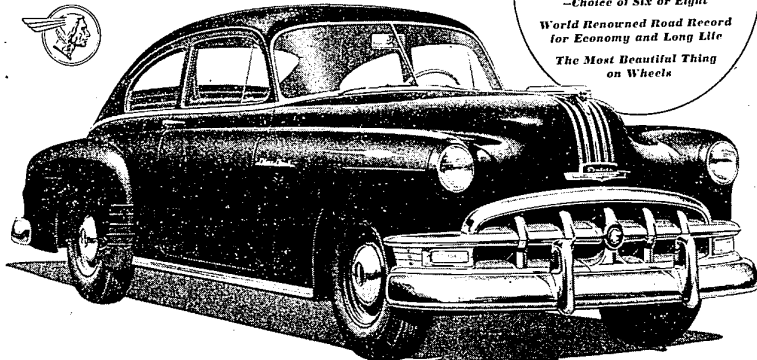
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
