Conservation Officers Have Police Status

Conservation officers now have the status of peace officers in an enforcing conservation laws as the result of the Governor signing the bill recently passed by the state legislature.

The department's law enforcement division points out this does not give the officer unlimited right to make searches. The conservation officer does have the right to inspect the game bag, fish creel, a vehicle, fish house and other places except dwelling houses - but only when he has probable cause to believe a violation of conservation law has been committed.

Warn Merchants Against Cashing Stolen Checks

Merchants and banks are warned against cashing checks bearing Serial Numbers B939972 through B930800 payable through Detroit Bank; also Servicemen Readjustment Allowance Checks Number 4542995 through 4542100 payable through Industrial National Bank.

The M. U. C. C. Branch Office at 16310 Grand River was burglarized around midnite Tuesday, June 13, and 336 checks were stolen, according to S. J. McLeod, Branch Manager. Locks on two doors were jammed and a safe weighing over 300 lbs. was carried out of a rear door. Police later recovered the safe at 3:30 a.m. on a West Side Street. The safe had been broken into and checks and cash removed.

A Burroughs check writing machine and a check coder were also taken as well as signature plates that are used to validate the checks.

McLeod stated that a similar burglary in the Lincoln Park M. U. C. C. Office occurred over the Decoration Day week end and 1261 checks were taken on that occasion.

LONG WEEK END PULLS 400,000 TO EIGHT STATE PARKS

The four-day holiday week end pulled over 400,000 persons into eight state parks alone, first attendance returns compiled by the conservation department's parks division show.

Memorial Day, which drew 100,000 of the total at these locations saw the close of National Parks and Recreation Week which was observed with special activities at many of the 60 state parks and recreation areas.

Bay City and Grand Haven parks closely competed for the popularity honor in the four-day holiday period with the former winning out by the narrow margin of 1,000 visitors. Mechanical traffic counters showed 107,000 visitors at Bay City and 106,000 at Grand Haven. Other leaders were Holland, 56,000; Muskegon, 46,000; Rochester - Utica, 43,000; and Dodge No. 4, another 18,800.

Fishing attracted more persons than anticipated, although pluckers as usual outnumbered all other park users.

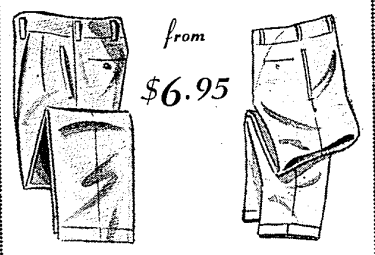

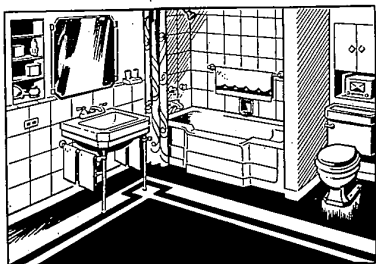
