Mrs. John Lewis of Parker Street held a surprise party on Saturday for Madeline Galt of Hugo. There were 22 present.

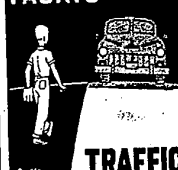

MORE TRAINING IS BUSINESS DEMAND, U-M DEAN REPORTS

Business institutions are demanding more training of the college graduates they are hiring today, reports Russell A. Stevenson, dean of the University of Michigan School of Business Administration. Similar interest has been shown by students in getting intensive instruction before going into business fields, he said. This is indicated by the more than 100 per cent increase in graduate enrollment in the School since the war.

There are over 400 candidates for the degree of Master of Business Administration at the University, the dean said, and 30 students working for the doctor's degree. He looks for an even greater enrollment in the years to come. The University's graduate program in business is the third largest in the country.

Before the war there were less than 200 candidates at Michigan for graduate degrees in business.

Start Offensive Against Insects

Organized offensive against insects and diseases, forest enemies which annually destroy as much timber as forest fires, is planned in Michigan by six federal and state agencies, the conservation department announces.

Launching the state's forest pest detection and control program will be the U. S. Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, U. S. Forest Service, University of Michigan school of forestry and conservation, Michigan State College division of forestry, state department of agriculture's bureau of plant industry and the state conservation department's forestry division.

Framework of the detection program now is being outlined at regional meetings conducted by the conservation department. U. S. funds will be available for emergency pest control, in much the same manner as federal Clarke-Mckinstry money is provided to the states for forest fire work.

"Recent development in insecticides and methods of application now make it economically feasible to start organized control measures," says S. McIntire, state forestry chief. "While ground spraying of infested timber stands has been improved, our major tool will be the use of the airplane for aerial spraying."

"Michigan has a lot of acreage devoted to tree plantations in national and state forests and on private land. As plantations develop the insect population also increases because of the ideal, concentrated food supply. Danger to natural stands is equally important."

Due to natural controls, many insect and disease outbreaks die out, McIntire says. However, before they do much damage, McIntire notes. Occasionally, however, an outbreak will reach epidemic proportions and must be controlled if timber is to be saved.

Michigan has well over 500,000 acres of pine plantations in various stages of development on federal, state, community, school and private lands.

McIntire says the top enemies of Michigan forests and woodlots are such insects as the red-headed pine sawfly, European pine shoot-borer, spruce budworm, pine tip-borer, and the hemlock looper. Chief diseases are white pine blister, popular canker, Dutch elm disease and oak wilt. The latter two diseases have not been detected in the state as yet. Oak wilt is as close by as Gary, Indiana. One questionable spot in southwestern Michigan is under observation.

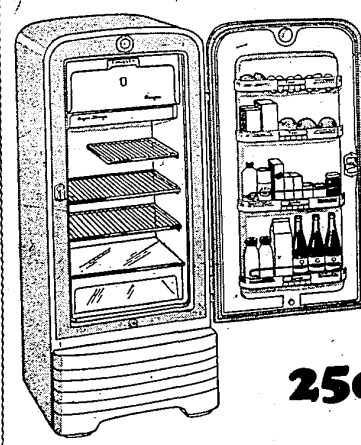
