Three lanes wide and stretching from the Farmington Road intersection to Truck Road on the east in Farmington, was packed even tighter by more cars joining it at the 11 Mile and Novi Intersections. Farmington police hand-operated the city's single traffic light from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.

CONDEMNED, HOLIDAY DRIVING. All police, city, township, and state, unilaterally condemned driving on "week ends." 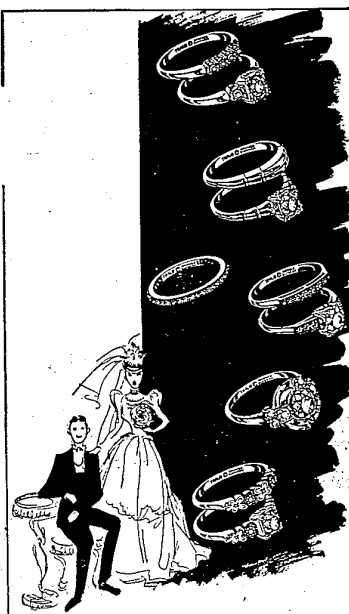
