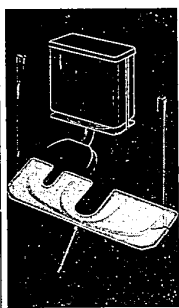

## ELBOW GREASE IS FINAL ANSWER TO CONTROL OF BUGS

Old-fashioned elbow grease cannot be replaced entirely by the new preparations for controlling household insects. Because of the many places where insects can hide in homes, it is difficult to get insecticides in all of the areas affected.

Control of insects in the home begins and ends with good housekeeping, advises Ray Jones, extension specialist in entomology at Michigan State College. Breeding areas should be eliminated as far as possible.

For instance, carpet beetles can

breed in many areas and do get started in cold air ducts where flat has collected. Beetles that feed on prepared cereals may be continually breeding in such materials that have been spilled behind cupboards. Unless such breeding areas are cleaned up the use of insecticides will not give complete control.

We should not expect complete eradication from one treatment, Jones believes, because, although it is possible, it is not feasible in most cases. Continually working at the job is the only way to get complete eradication.

It is very important to read carefully the instructions for the use of insecticides and to follow them to the letter after first doing a thorough job of housecleaning.

Concerning the control of moths, Jones reports that the most reliable procedure for protecting clothes in storage in the home is the use of either Paradichlorobenzene or naphthalene (mothballs). The use of moth proofing material may or may not prove successful.

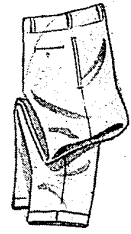
