End Hazards Of Live-Trapping Skunks

The hazards of live-trapping skunks have come to an end at the conservation department's Rose Lake experiment station.
Game workers lure the odorous little animal into a box with an odorless bait, and then, instead of being released, the skunk is killed by a lethal dose of strychnine, and the final enticement is a "loaded" ball of ground meat. The meatball conceals a capsule of penicillin, a drug which produces an early death in the skunk, long enough for game men to safely examine, tag and release it.
Game men report weasels, raccoons and opossums also find a trip of smoked herring irresistible.

All of this disturbing preparation is likely, as long as the war clouds are on the horizon, to prompt apprehensive housewives to "play safe" by purchasing a few extra pounds of sugar; families to take that year-planned vacation in the near future and perhaps to order a new automobile, television set, clothes and other commodities which might become scarce articles. Hearing of this kind will have one inevitable result: An artificial shortage, thus created, will skyrocket prices unnecessarily.
And yet human nature may be expected to function, as it always does.

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Spike Reports Of Parking, Admission Costs At Parks

Moving to spike incorrect reports, the conservation department's parks division states there is no admission or parking charge collected at any one of the 60 state parks and recreation areas.
Several news accounts referring to the 50-cent camping charge — which became effective June 15 in parks where tent or trailer camping is available — have led many persons to believe gate fees would be collected from park patrons. For the average park user, park officials stress, there are absolutely no charges with which to contend.
To help meet park operating costs, the conservation department recently approved a camping charge for tent and trailer users of 60 cents per day per camp.
