Breathing by Electricity



The newest weapon in the battle against infantile paralysis is demonstrated by Dr. Elton T. Calhoun, medical director of the Sister Kenny Polio Center near Pontiac. It is an electro-phonic respirator, which can be used in place of an iron lung in certain bulbar polio cases. When the pen-shaped conductor the doctor is holding is touched to the phrenic nerve, electric current forces the patient to breathe. The Kenny Center, which is supported by the United Fund, is the only hospital in Michigan where the famous technique of Sister Kenny is employed and patients are accepted from any part of the state. Charlene and James Miller of Waldron are vacationing at the home of their grandmother, Mrs. Jennie Burkett of Iphaca, Michigan.

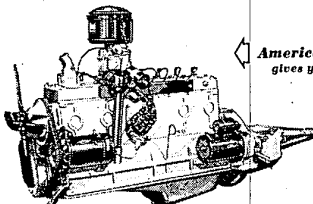

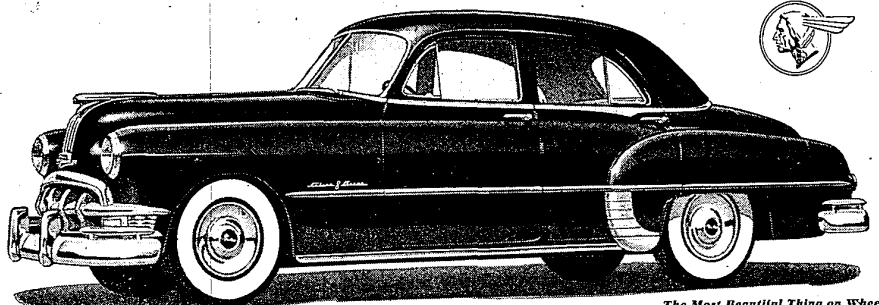
