Repair Work On School Started

Work was started this week on the reconstruction of the north wall at the Central School, Louis Schmidt, superintendent, announced.

The contract for the rebuilding of the footings and foundation was awarded to the Olson Construction Company, East Detroit, by the Clearview Board of Education on July 1.

The work is expected to be completed by the opening of school September 6.

Schmidt also announced that work on the building and widening of sidewalks at the Clearview High School has been completed. The James Construction Company was awarded the contract for the work. New sidewalks were put in leading to the new classroom-gymnasium addition and the walk widened from the north entrance of the high school to the parking lot.

All of the interior work at the Edgewood School has been completed and the grade school is ready for use this fall. The classroom and kitchen in the temporary building behind the Edgewood School has been repaired. Eight rooms in the Central School have been painted. Schmidt stated that painting of two more classrooms at Central School would have to wait until the work on the foundation has been completed.

Repainting and redecorating of the home economics house at the high school is expected to get underway this week. Regular school maintenance men will do the work.

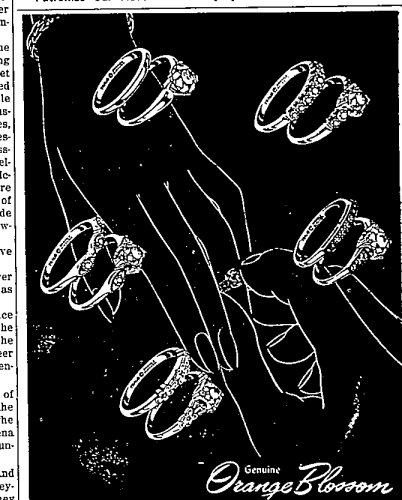

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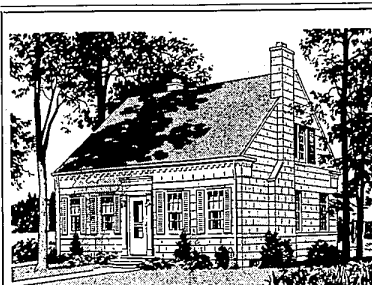
