## Young 'Separates' Do Double-Duty

NEW YORK—Switch-about separates for children, designed by Margit Fellegi, are meant to double a small wardrobe and, at the same time, cut down on laundry. They are also "dress-yourself" styles with no buttons, no snaps and no fasteners of any kind.

For school, the jumpers, jackets, and skirts come in corduroy and in sturdy cotton. Blouses and pants-coat, which is a combination panty and petticoat, are shown in white broadcloth or in self-patterned nylon with matching nylon lace. They also come in checked gingham to be worn with solid color jumpers and skirts.

Party news is found in a "little lady" suit of black velvet which has a snowy lace-trimmed blouse. A straight-cut jacket is teamed with a panner jumper.

The "hi-jump" skirt for little girls, and older girls, too, is designed to fit snugly, without alteration. Elastic shirring makes a flexible waist which allows the skirt to "grow" with the child. The skirt is teamed with ruffled blouses which have no buttons or slide fasteners.

A pinafore dress of star-flower printed cotton has ruffles over the shoulders and a small, shirred waist. The full skirt has inserts of solid color.

It's the shirring which makes these corduroy skirts fit without alteration. They "grow" with the child. Buttonless blouse is easy for a small child to put on. Ruffles stretch flat for simple ironing.
