The Enterprise will publish shortly a series of articles on City Manager organization and operation. We will also invite readers to present questions which will be published along with answers. We feel it is a vital responsibility to inform the public on such questions of major importance to their future and the future of the community. Such questions will be answered factually, regardless of our personal feelings. Increased interest in the issue can and must be stimulated by the active service and civic organizations in the city. They should be planning right now a series of facts programs on City Manager government. It should be the primary subject at regular meetings and even beyond. By the time the polls open for the general election in November, the entire population should be not only aware of the facts but ready and anxious to vote.

However, the purpose of the charter change issue is to make way for City Management type of government. If the public approves the change in charter issue, a charter comprision is then elected, and they make the necessary changes clearing the way for City Manager government. The public then must approve the specific repairs before it is final. The whole picture must be explained before the first vote, however. The public must know the facts and procedure. It is a community responsibility.

It is not entirely the result of indifference on the part of the County. They say, and it's undoubtedly true, that they do not have the finances to do the job right. Orchard Lake is one of the oldest concrete roads in the county. It must be torn up, widened, drained and resurfaced. This is an extremely expensive moiect.

However, the fact still remains that traffic is increasing on this road in spite of its unsafe condition. As a result, accidents and near accidents are increasing. The only encouragement so far is that the road will be rebuilt as soon as enough money is available. That may be years. It should be now before more accidents cause death and injury. In the meantime some action should be taken to widen the shoulders and maintain them. Not just after an accident, but before — not just today, but until a proper road can be built that will once again link farmington with Oakland County.
