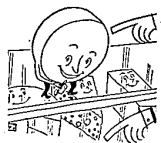

Fishing License Sales Drop 30% From 1949

Resident fishing license sales, down most of the year due primarily to unfavorable weather, now have fallen nearly 30 per cent off last year's pace.

License agent reports made to the conservation department thru July show 398,000 licensed resident fishermen as compared to 567,000 through the same month in 1949. Number of nonresident anglers also has decreased some. Annual nonresident license sales varied less than two per cent with agents issuing 62,000 as compared to 63,000 before. However, temporary nonresident license sales total 21,000 or

about 23 per cent less than the 27,000 recorded through seven months of last year.

Reflecting the generally below average fishing conditions in the opening weeks of the trout season is the 11 per cent drop in the number of trout stamps purchased. Agents report 166,000 sold as compared to 121,000 through July last year.

Retail minnow license sales improved some and now are down only about six per cent as compared to over 10 per cent in the previous monthly license report. Department records show 1,603 issued as compared to 1,709 last year at this time. Wholesale minnow license sales increased nearly five per cent from 142 to 152.

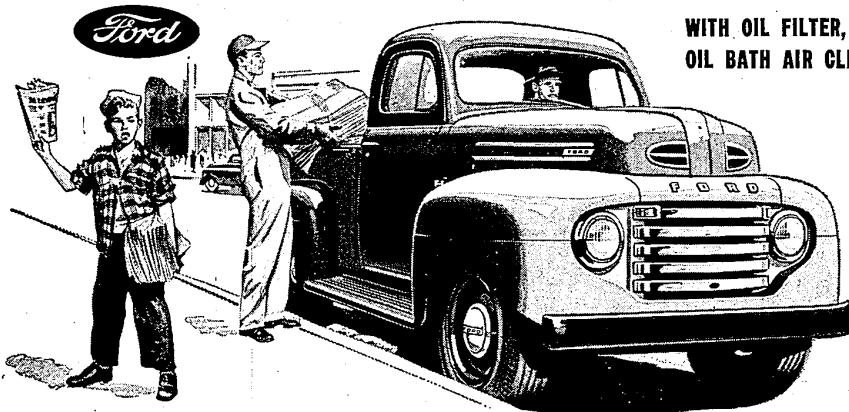
