as assistant high school principal. He will also work with attendance problems. Six elementary teachers have been added, Duncanson announced. One teacher has been added at the Bond School, two at the Middlebelt School, and three at the Farmington Elementary School.

Two four hour sessions will be inaugurated with the opening of the new school year at the Farmington and Middlebelt schools. At Farmington, two sessions will be in effect in the first through the fifth grades. The first and second grades will be in two sessions at the Middlebelt School. Morning sessions will begin at 8:15 and run to 12:15 with afternoon sessions beginning at 12:30 and running until 4:30.

Buses will leave the school at 7:45 to pick up youngsters for the morning sessions at 10 Mile and Middlebelt schools and at 11:45 for youngsters attending afternoon sessions. Morning Kindergarten sessions will begin at 9:00 at Fairview School, Middlebelt School and German School and at 8:15 at the Ten Mile School. Afternoon sessions will start at 12:30 at the Ten Mile School, Middlebelt School and German School and 1:00 at the Fairview School. The Farmington 4th grade will begin at 9:00 and run to 2:30 and the third and fourth grades at the Middlebelt School will start at 9:00 and run until 3:00 as will the fourth and fifth grades at William Grace, the fifth and sixth grades at Noble and the first through sixth grades at Bond.

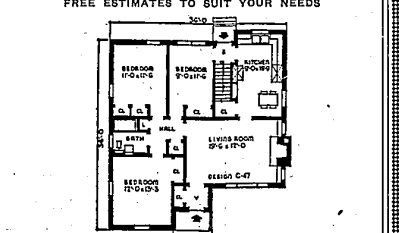
Three new teachers have been added to the Clarenceville teaching staff to handle the increased enrollment. Two new teachers have been added in the elementary grades and one new teacher in the high school. Two four-hour sessions will begin in the first grades at both Central and Edgewood Schools. Morning sessions will begin at 8:15 and run until 12:15 and afternoon sessions will start at 12:30 and continue until 4:30. High school classes will begin at 8:30 instead of 8:40, giving students 5 minutes more at noon and will allow them to get out of school 5 minutes earlier.
