Reveal County Wheat Allotment
Oakland County's wheat acreage allotment for the 1951 crop has been established by the Production and Marketing Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture at 10,472 acres, according to Walter R. Cook, Chairman of the Oakland County PMA Committee.

This allotment, Mr. Cook said, represents Oakland County's proportionate share of the national allotment of 72,784,000 acres and the State allotment of 1,114,098 acres.

The County allotment will be broken down into individual grower allotments and a notice of allotment will be sent to each grower, Mr. Cook said.

Growers will be under no legal compulsion to plant within their allotments, Mr. Cook emphasized, but those growers who do plant in excess of their assigned allotment will not be eligible for storage agreements on their 1951 wheat crop under the provisions of the price support law.

The chairman said that the nation is now in a very strong position in regard to wheat supplies because of a carryover of 450 million bushels from the 1949 crop and estimated 1950 harvest of 957 million bushels.

Based on average yields, the 1951 national wheat acreage allotment, plus the anticipated carryover on July 1, 1951, will provide a supply of 1 1/2 billion bushels for the marketing year beginning July 1, 1951. This is amply sufficient to provide for our domestic consumption, expected exports, and a reserve of 30 per cent.

The wheat allotments were established after the outbreak of hostilities in Korea, Mr. Cook said, and this situation was fully considered in setting up the suggested wheat acreage goal for 1951.

STATE PRISONERS BUILDING SHELTERS AT STATE PARK
