MSC Students Want
Sports Televised

More than 70 per cent of the students at Michigan State College believe that college sports should be televised, although telecasting of football games was recently banned by the Western Conference.

In a radio listening survey conducted this summer by the MSC department of speech, dramatics and radio education, 73 per cent of the 977 students interviewed favored the sports by video. Seventy-seven per cent of the students, however, said that they would not stay from the game to watch it on television.

Students in favor of TV for college sports said that people otherwise unable to attend the events would have a chance to watch them. The chief objection to televising sports was that students wanted to "keep commercialism off the campus."
