## Founder Of MSC Vet School Dies

Dr. Richard P. Lyman, 79, founder of the Michigan State College of Veterinary Medical School, died Saturday morning, August 25, following a long illness. After organizing the veterinary school at MSC in 1909, he served as dean until 1923, when he retired to enter private business.

His death followed by one month the death of his successor as dean of veterinary medicine, Dr. Ward Glitter. Dr. Glitter, who headed the vet school from 1923 until his retirement in 1948, died July 14.
