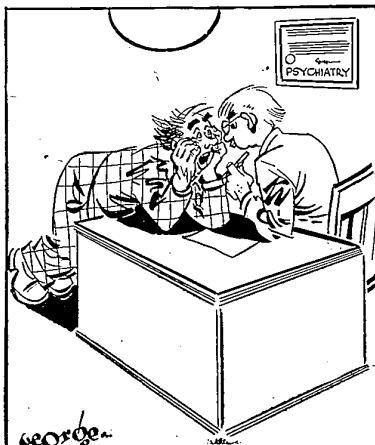

said, and predicted that a special state police squad will be created immediately to "spearhead activities".

Leonard says that if a bomb were dropped on Detroit tomorrow, things could be kept fairly well under control... for one thing, the state control center is organized...

"No responsible labor groups" have protested against the legislative plan to curb Communists and other "fellow travelers" in Michigan, so reports Paul Williams, secretary for Governor Webber. One state group did register a kick: the Michigan Civil Rights Congress. Incidentally, the United States attorney-general listed the outfit as a Communist-front organization, adhering to the Red propaganda line.

If Michigan has a migrant labor problem, so does about every other state. The New York Times recently ran a series of articles on it. Puerto Rican workers have been complaining about wages and housing conditions in Michigan. One variable factor: The weather. What can we do about it? Even the government's long-range forecast for August was badly off.

When Michigan's 1,315,000 school children returned to classes this fall, they found 15,000 will have only half-day sessions because of crowded conditions in the buildings.

Another move has been made toward the completion of the \$4,000,000 eight-story state office building. The sum of \$33,800 has been appropriated for completion of plans and specifications.

Bad as war news may seem, things don't look altogether black. Michigan divorce rates have dropped 50 per cent since 1946. Marriage dropped, too, but now only 5.1 persons of every 1,000 are divorced. It was 10.2 in 1946.

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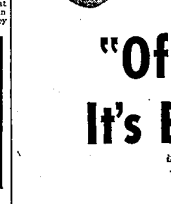
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
