Library Director Speaks To AAUW

Mrs. Fannie F. Noonan, Director of State Aid to Public Libraries, spoke on "A Community Centered Library" at the January meeting of the Farmington Branch of the American Association of University Women January 24. Invited guests included members of the Farmington Library Board, Mrs. Fred Cook, Mrs. Harley Gibson, Mrs. E. V. Ayres, Mrs. Fred Menke, Mrs. Carl Ritter and Mrs. Anna Brown; Mrs. A. M. Leach, Librarian; and Mr. James Tennant, City Manager.

Mrs. Noonan defined a community centered library as one which serves all individuals, groups and organizations, with its objectives being to assemble materials, serve the community, and provide opportunity and encouragement to educate all continuously. There are few libraries which meet all these objectives because of lack of support to fill the need and lack of publicity. Library needs are adequate buildings, comfortable furnishings, adequate staff, adequate book stock, and adequate financial support.

In an open discussion following Mrs. Noonan's talk, it was learned that Farmington Library is a Class A library and is the most poorly supported library in the state in this class. It is no longer eligible for State Library Aid. To receive this financial aid a library must meet certain financial requirements and standards. Farmington does not meet these because without adequate financial support from the city and township, the standards cannot be met.

Mrs. Lloyd Smith, Status of Women Chairman, reported on a seminar in Ann Arbor November 30 where representatives of all the women's auxiliary services and the American Red Cross discussed what the women's services are doing and can do.
