Making of memorial poppies, which will be worn on Poppy Day in May to honor America's war dead, is now in full swing in Veterans Hospitals throughout the country. Thousands of disabled veterans will be given employment during the making of the poppies.

An estimated 25,000,000 poppies will be made by the disabled men for the Auxiliary in the Veterans' Hospitals and in convalescent work shops maintained by the Auxiliary.

Poppy making not only enables the men to earn money, but it also gives them an interesting occupation with which to fill the long hospital hours. It is considered valuable as occupational therapy.

The winter for the first time veterans of the Korean War are expected to take part in making the poppies along with veterans of World Wars I and II.
