It also looks sloppy, leading one to think bedlam had reigned every day.

If these conditions existed in the days when we went to school, people would throw up their hands in horror, and rightly so. Any child

doing wrong would be punished, also, but he would learn something. We had to keep our rooms neat, we studied instead of wandering our time and there was no running around the halls every time we felt like it.
