COMMUNITY ATTACK RECOMMENDED TO CONTROL GRUBS

"To be really successful, the grub fight should be conducted on a community basis," according to Ray L. James, extension specialist in entomology.

"January to June is the grub or warble control period in Michigan," James adds. This long control season for the grub is due to the presence of two different species. One, the common beetle grub, does its damage in the backs of the animals usually during January to mid-March. The bomb fly grubs "in-late" mid-March to June.

Fortunately, it is easy to remember how to control these two pests because they both are stopped by the insecticide rotenone. "You can take your pick of three methods for control with rotenone," James says.

For a dust use a minimum of one and a half per cent strength rotenone. You can put it on with a hand duster or the dust may be applied over the area of the warble and then worked down through the hair with a brush or by hand to the opening on top of the warble or swelling. To be effective, the rotenone must enter the grub opening.

Use seven and a half pounds of five per cent or 9 1/2 pounds of four per cent rotenone concentrate with one quart of water for spraying cat-tails. "We do not recommend spraying cattle in winter, however," James says. Pressures of 250 to 400 pounds usually give the best results.

You can use salves, with petroleum jelly as the base and containing one and a half per cent rotenone. Salves are put directly on top of the warble. Your county agricultural agent has further information on this topic, James reminds farmers.

November Violations Drab 483 Days In Jail

Violators of conservation laws spent more than twice as much time in jail in November than in the same 1950 month, the conservation department disclosed.

Arrests increased slightly from 1,084 to 1,122, but jail terms were hiked from 195 to 483 total days. Fines and costs amounted to \$33,243, about \$500 more.

As expected, deer hunters were responsible for the bulk of the court cases. Conservation officers made 314 arrests for possession of loaded firearms in cars.

On one million dollars had already been spent on the bases—when suddenly the Pentagon changed its mind and decided not to build them.

The war preparedness committee is quietly investigating who is responsible for this expensive boner. One report is that the air-strips weren't built on solid ground and sank into the sand; another report is that the rainy season flooded out at least one base.

STALIN GETS MAD

If we get discouraged over governing the waste and efficiency here at home, it might pay to look at an official report from Moscow that Marshal Stalin has secretly visited Russian airfields in the Baltic to find out what's holding up his plan to build a powerful fleet of super-battlehips.

American observers report that Stalin was furious at the excuses his admirals have been giving for Russia's failure to turn out a single new battleship since 1939.

Therefore, accompanied by 200 secret police, he personally inspected the naval installations where three 50,000-ton battleships are under construction. The inefficiency and blunders he saw, especially at Gdynia, infuriated him even more, and Stalin has now ordered a complete purge of the Russian admirals responsible.

WELL-SUITED CONGRESSMAN

Some strange things have gone on in the offices of congressmen.

There was the late senator from Florida, Park Trammell, who slept in his office, never rented a hotel or apartment in Washington.

Then there was his opposite number from New York, Charles A. Buckley, who became known as the "phantom congressman," because he was rarely in his office or, for that matter, in Washington. Buckley is still in congress, but his attendance record is much better.

Discovers Ways To Ease Budget

With some meat prices soaring into the luxury class, it takes close planning to feed growing children who need abundant amounts of protein.

Mary Lewis of the food and nutrition department at Michigan State College has some schemes, however, that may help keep the lid on the budget.

Fish has a much protein content as meat and it is generally less expensive, so try the family on some, new menus keyed with fish, she suggests. And canned meat that has little protein are often good buys. She reminds us of corned beef that can be perked up in casseroles or combined with salad dressing for hearty sandwiches.

Growing boys who seem to require third and fourth servings of meat can be satisfied with side dishes rich in protein, such as macaroni and cheese, or lima bean casseroles. Miss Lewis points out that adolescents digest food more rapidly, so they need the staying qualities of hearty foods like meat, gravies, beans and cheese. And if the boys seem to be eating unreasonable amounts, remember this—it takes a half to three-quarters more protein for an adolescent than it does for an adult.

Save the leftover meats for another meal and have peanut butter and plain yellow cheese on hand for sandwiches and snacks. Stretch lunches with servings of cottage cheese, another protein food.

Another bit of advice that Miss Lewis passes along is the use of dried milk for cream or pumpkin pie. Dried milk can be used in all cooking and is considerably less expensive than bottle milk.
