## Reserves Whip Northville 39-18

The Clarencville Reserves defeated Northville 39-18 in the last game of the season on the Clarencville Friday, February 27. The Reserves have won four out of the last six starts, which gives them a five hundred average for the season.

In the first period of the game Northville played on even terms with Clarencville, both teams getting four points. Clarencville broke loose in the second period to record ten points while holding Northville to seven points, and this put them ahead at the end of the half 14-11.

At the end of the third period the score showed Clarencville up in front by the safe margin of 27 to 13. In the fourth period Clarencville again outscored Northville and they ended the game with a 32 to 15 victory.

## Senior Hi-Lite

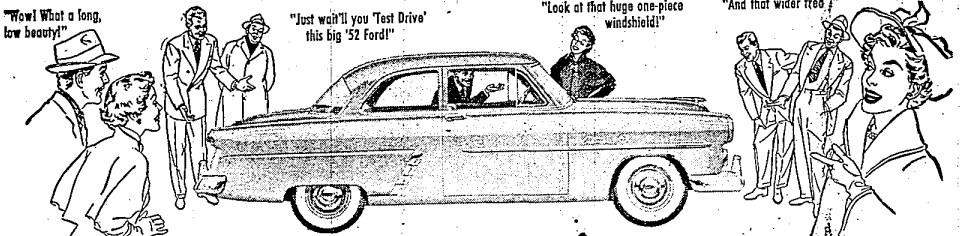

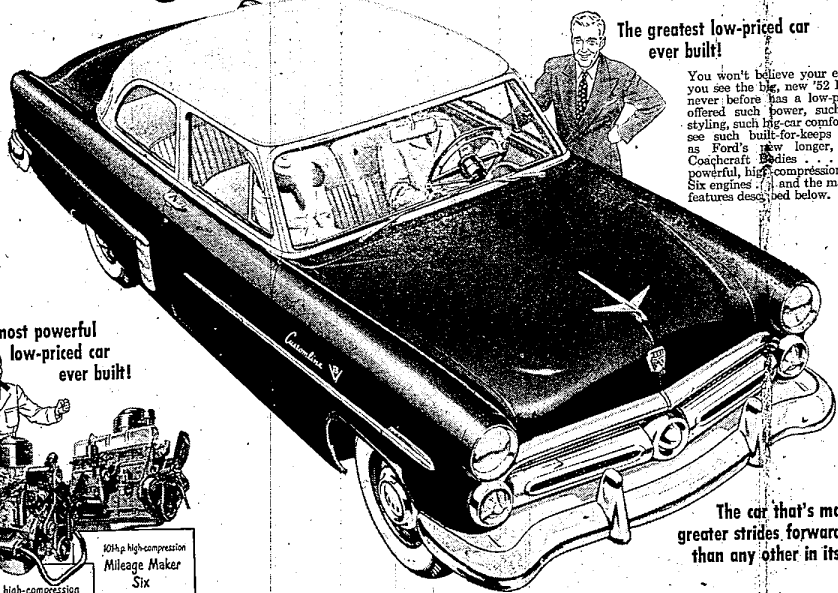

## FHA Girls Make Yarn Animals To Sell

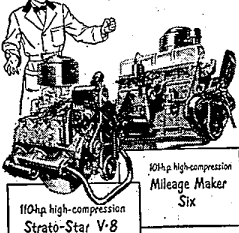

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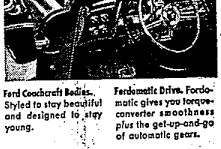
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
