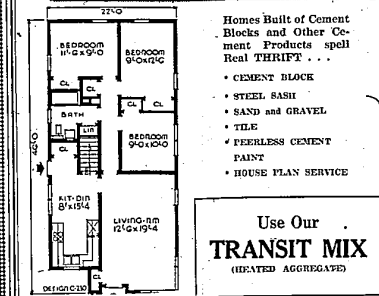
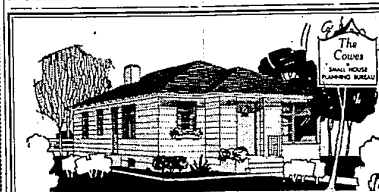
Board Of Review

If answer to inquiries concerning the jump in Township tax rates, Blanchard released figures to show that the assessed valuation for the 1951 tax was set at \$49,067.28. The assessed valuation set by the State Equalization Board personnel who came into Farmington Township was raised to \$19,195.12. Finally, the assessed valuation upon which the 1951 tax rate was based was \$16,341,059 set by the Oakland County Committee. The Oakland County figure is \$6,272,229 above the figure reached by Blanchard.

The present sessions of the Boards of Review are in session to consider the 1952 tax.

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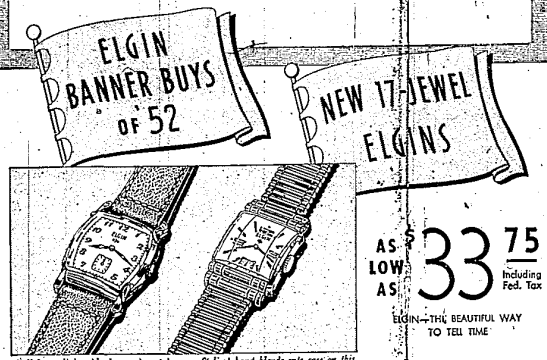
