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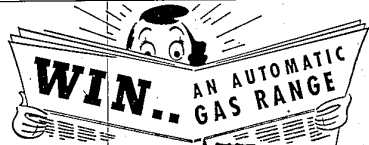

Best guess of Mr. Truman's intimates is that he is carefully laying the groundwork for a "draft Truman" campaign after the boomlets for all the other candidates have run their course.

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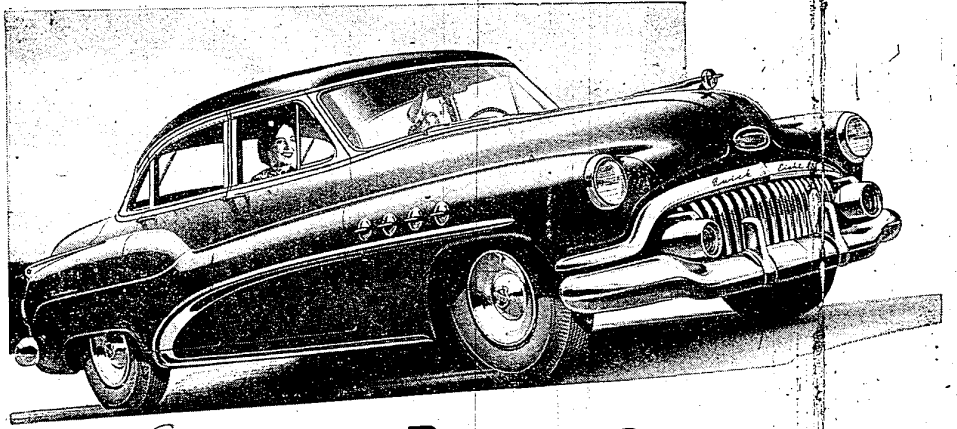
