Mrs. Green led the discussion on farm accidents. The discussion brought to light that a higher rate of accidents happen on the farm than anywhere else. Mrs. Green decided that some accidents can be prevented by putting safety devices on tractors and other machinery and to keep signs on it. Safety signs should be painted yellow. Second, it was decided that traffic should stop when approaching a farm house from the front. Third, Mr. Harry McCracken volunteered to report all farm accidents as a matter of record for this area.
