Phony Officer Not Mall Employee

LIVONIA A 38-year-old Livonia man who has been charged by Farmington Township police with impersonating a police officer has no history of employment as a Livonia Mall security guard.

Roger Robert of 29510 Bretton, Livonia, is awaiting examination on the charge before Farmington District Judge Michael Hand after standing mute at his March 30 arraignment.

An Observer news story April 7, telling of the arrest

and arraignment, identified Robert as a Livonia Mall guard based upon information from the Livonia police detective bureau. Further investigation revealed Robert is a discharged employe of a private Detroit-based security company which does serve some shopping areas, but Livonia Mall is not among them.

"He's never worked for us," said Roger Peris, general manager of the Livonia Mall. "We've never had a record of a Roger Robert on our payroll."

Peris went on to explain that the mall hires its own guards, and provides them distinctive uniforms. The court charge against Robert asserts that while wearing a "police type" uniform he showed a badge, identified himself as a Livonia officer and allegedly stole a wallet containing \$150 from a South Lyon resident.

Israeli Students Visit Here

students is six days, rather than five, and that Orthodox and two thirds non-

"We don't observe Sunday as a holy day," Ezra said. "We observe the Shabat (Sabbath) on Saturday. That day there is no school, no work, nothing. But the other six days we learn."

Free, compulsory education in Israel extends only to ninth grade. If a student wishes to continue his education, he must pay for it himself.

Shomroni and Miss Bar-On are 12th graders, and Ezra and Miss Ben-Meir are 11th graders.

Ezra says the typical Israeli student curriculum would include math, Bible, English, French or Arabic, history, physics and chemistry.

In a "professional" school, the student chooses the career he wishes to pursue, such as engineering or secretarial work and concentrates

only on that. All schools are public, with one-third being Orthodox and two thirds non-Orthodox.

In Israel all must serve a hitch in the army upon high school graduation or when they reach age 18. Men must serve three years and females 20 months.

Shomroni says Israelis accept this as a way of life. "You have to consider there are only two and a half million Jews and 100 million Arabs."

In their tour of Southfield and Farmington schools, the students were impressed, but not extremely so.

"We found every school had a different character," Miss Ben-Meir said. "Some students were very interested and some very apathetic."

"We found some anti-Semitism in the Southfield school," she continued. "We talked with some of the Jewish students about this. Some

were interested and some didn't care." In North Farmington High School, students seemed interested and well-informed. Shomroni said, "At least, some of them knew some things about Israel."

As for the student apathy, Miss Ben-Meir says the same exists in Israel among the students.

If American students came to our country, they might run into the same thing. The cultural exchange program is in conjunction with Israel's 25th anniversary. Of several hundred Israeli students, 36 were chosen to participate. They were divided into groups of four, each visiting different cities over a period of six weeks.

The students here were sponsored by the Detroit Zionist Federation and are staying in local homes during their 1 1/2 week visit.
