Children, Invalids Rooms Are Marked

FARMINGTON A new fire safety program known as Operation Red Ball has begun in Farmington.

Four-inch red vinyl decals are being distributed through the schools and city and township fire departments for display in the upper left hand corner of a child's or invalid's bedroom.

Purpose is to let firemen know where such persons are located in event of a fire or other emergency.

The decals will be available at all city and township fire stations. Parents of preschoolers and relatives of invalids are urged to secure

them from the stations. Other children will receive them at their schools.

National surveys have found, sponsors said, that small children tend to hide under beds or in closets when fire breaks out. Often they suffocate before firemen find them.

The Red Ball rescue program was begun in Indianapolis and is sponsored nationwide by the Jaycees and the American Red Ball Transit Co.

Gov. Milliken has declared the week ending April 13 as Operation Red Ball Week in Michigan.

Free Shots Are Offered

FARMINGTON Free immunizations will be offered in Farmington next week to children from ages three months through high school.

They can be obtained Thursday, April 12, from 9 a.m. to noon at First Methodist Church, Warner and Grand River.

Either the primary series or booster shots will be provided for diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, poliomyelitis, measles (rubella), German measles (rubella), Tuberculin skin tests also will be offered.

No appointment is necessary but previous immunization records should be brought in.

The same shots also are offered at the South Oakland Health Department, 2725 Greenfield, Southfield, Monday through Friday.
