"I've taken another 140 acres and put it into wheat. Now. I find that the field corn is getting to be a drag on the market and some of last year's crop isn't even harvested."

Denver Cockrum, who used to grow about 800 acres of sweet corn at 10-Mile and Napier Roads, is cutting back to 50. He dealt mostly with chain stores and no longer can keep up with fluctuating prices.

Another is Elmer Schultz at Beck and Proctor Roads. He has about 300 acres, and now sweet corn will be just a memory.


