ZIEM ANNOUNCES CANDIDACY FOR PROSECUTOR

Chief Assistant Oakland County Prosecuting Attorney Frederick C. Ziem has announced that he will seek the prosecutor's office on the Republican ticket in the September primary.

Ziem's announcement was the first made by any candidate for any county office. He will run for the office now held by Prosecuting Attorney Clyde D. Underwood, who will not be a candidate for reelection. Born in Detroit in 1916, Ziem has been a resident of Oakland County for 30 years. He was educated in the Pontiac Public Schools, graduating from Pontiac High School in 1933. He attended the University of Michigan, where he played three years of varsity football and received his bachelor's degree in 1938. Ziem graduated from the U. of M. Law School in 1941 and was admitted to the State Bar in the fall of that year.

In early 1943, Ziem entered the army as a private, serving with the Medical Corps and in the Judge Advocate General's Department. He was discharged as First Lieutenant in 1945. Prosecutor Underwood appointed him as assistant prosecutor in January, 1947, and raised him to chief assistant in 1950.

Ziem is married and has one son. He lives at Sylvan Lake and is a member of the Oakland County Bar Association and the State Bar of Michigan. He is also a member of the Pontiac Lodge No. 21, F. & A. M., Pontiac Civilian Club, Pontiac Lodge 810, B. P. O. E. and the "M" Club. He is a past commander of both the Jimmy Day Post 12, Amvets of Pontiac, and the Pontiac Council of Veterans.

The resolution was adopted following the reading of a legal opinion secured by the Board. The opinion stated that the theater must be licensed and that the Board has the authority to regulate certain operations in compliance with state regulations, including censorship of pictures. The opinion was secured following a complaint from some township residents' as to certain pictures shown at the theater.

Mr. John Reid, 31841 Dohany, appeared before the Board to ask if any action could be taken to set up a regular rubbish pick-up in the township. Ernest Blanchard, Township Supervisor, stated that efforts were made some time ago to work out a rubbish pick-up on a special assessment district basis in areas that wanted it. He added, however, that petitions were drawn but there was not sufficient interest to carry out the program.

The Board did authorize the holding of a spring election with the township with the dates to be set as soon as the condition of the roads permit. Harry McCracken, Township Clerk, was authorized to make necessary arrangements for the clean-up.



