### COUNTY HOME AGENT ADVISES FISH FOR MEALS

There are many good reasons for serving fish these days, observes Mrs. Josephine Lawver, county home demonstration agent. The first reason, of course, is the Lenton season but, too, fish are plentiful, reasonably inexpensive, and easy to prepare.

Mrs. Lawver recommends careful selection. Fresh fish have a firm quality; bright eyes and a sweet odor while stale fish tend to get fishy, smell sour, and turn brown and slimy. A good test, she said, is to make sure you can't permanently indent the flesh with your finger.

With 150 varieties to choose from, the homemaker has a wide range in cooking methods. They are all simple ones, too. Whether you pan fry, deep fry, broil, bake, steam or boil, be careful not to overcook. When the flesh can be easily flaked from the bones, it is at a moist, tender, flavorful stage. Then cook no longer, the home agent cautioned.

Generally, fat fishes such as salmon or shad should be baked or broiled because the fat content will keep them from drying out.
