- Such an investigation would:
1. Put state police records before the public.
  2. Allow more time and manpower for an investigation than could be allowed by congressional probes.
  3. Bring nicks and fellow travelers into the open.
  4. Bring the seriousness of the situation to public attention.

#### Marine Reserves To Get Summer Training

A full-scale summer training program for Marine Reservists, the first since the outbreak of Korean hostilities in June 1950, will get under way this month at Marine bases on both coasts, the Marine Corps announced this week.

First to participate in a series of intensive training under the program will be Volunteer, or inactive, Reserve Officers and non-coms enrolled in formal courses beginning this month. Organized Marine Reserve units, ground and air, will commence training in June for two-week periods, continuing through September.

- April 24, Wayne County building in Detroit. 202 descriptions in Wayne, St. Clair, Monroe, Oakland and Macomb Counties;
- April 25, county court house at Ann Arbor. 160 descriptions in Washtenaw, Jackson, Livingston, Ingham, Lenawee and Hillsdale Counties.


