FASTER, CHEAPER LIVESTOCK GAINS MADE ON PASTURE

Young lambs and calves with their dams will make the fastest and cheapest gains when they are on pasture.

L. H. Blakeslee, Michigan State College animal husbandman, says that "sows with pigs on clean, palatable pastures also make more economical gains than on dry feed alone. This is because pastures produce a good flow of the dam's milk and furnish more complete feed and nourishment than harvested grains or roughages."

For this reason, Blakeslee believes that livestock producers should provide all the good, palatable early spring pasture needed by the dams and their young.

He says that for early pastures, ryegrass, bluegrass and, in emergency cases, wheat, should be considered where soil and other conditions justify. Later on, high quality pastures such as alfalfa, ladino clover and other legumes with broom grass, timothy and other desirable grass mixtures are usually available. They will be ready soon after May 1.

REMOVE 980,000 INFECTED FRUIT TREES IN STATE

Since 1945, the Michigan Bureau of Plant Industry has removed more than 980,000 insect-infested or diseased fruit trees which were a menace to the fruit industry of the state. About 150,000 have been removed annually at an average cost of 17c per tree.

The beneficial results have already shown up in the better fruit produced in Michigan's orchards, stated C. A. Boyer, chief of the bureau. Fruits involved in this program are apples, peaches, pears, plums, cherries and grapes.

Nearly 50 years ago, the growers of Michigan fruit began to recognize that some day the old, diseased trees would have to be removed in order to help control this problem, but little was done until Act 72 of the Public Acts of 1945 was put on the statute books.

This extensive accomplishment has been made possible by using bulldozers operating in the area where requests have been made for tree removals. Each request received by the Michigan Department of Agriculture is investigated and the trees inspected to determine the presence of disease or insects.

Gives Information On Raising Berries

A few raspberries in the home garden are always nice so you may enjoy red, luscious, fresh raspberries swimming in cream. Twenty-four plants or a 100-foot row will produce enough fruit for the average family, reports Willard E. Rosserman, Assistant County Agricultural Agent. The life of the red raspberry plant will average eight to ten years. The black or purple plants average five to seven years.

In choosing a site, choose one away from old plants and brambles, including wild species. The soil should be a well drained loam. Light and lacks fertility and dries out greatly, and the plants seldom thrive on heavy clay.

Latham is the most popular red variety and is extensively grown for market use and the berries are large, firm, and attractive in appearance, but have a tendency to crumble. The Taylor is especially recommended both for home and market use. The berries are large, firm and of good quality. It is one of the best for canning and freezing. Indian Summer is the best fall bearing variety.

Cumberland is the leading black raspberry.
