PIN PUSHERS WIN

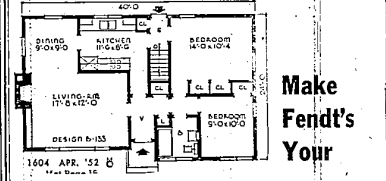
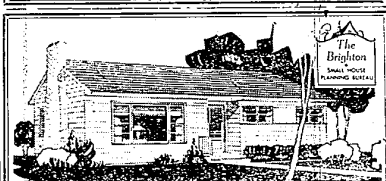

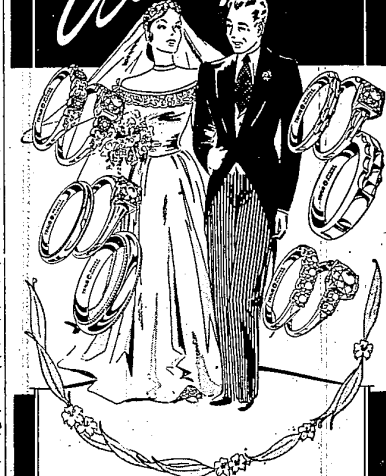

MAYPOLES AND MAY BASKETS

But maybe yuh aint never heerd of May baskets. Back in Iowa where we come from the small fry always make a fancy paper basket and on the first day of May if somebody likes yuh pretty much you'll find this basket all filled with wild flowers on yer front door but cha don't know fer sure who put it there. We aint heard much about such goin' ons since we've bin in Michigan butcha know it's a nice custom. Yuh know it's a kinda nice custom, too, to have our customers come in and say "Hi" and fer us to be able to greet them by their name and we know a lotta people by name on account of they go lockers here. Speakin' of lockers, the rain didn't hurt the rhubarb none so it's growin' and the asparagus is up and pretty soon now people will be totin' in that stuff to freeze so they can have it next winter. Now we wanna tell yuh about the locker containers we have and that yuh'll soon be needin'. First there's those all plastic Freez-tainers that hold 25 oz. and sell for \$3.25 a dozen. Now this is last year's figger, the next shipment is gonna cost more. Then there's the old stand-by - the Vapo-can - that's a pint and a half size - and they're 20 waxed cardboard boxes and 20 plastic lids for \$1.95. We have a good supply of pint and quart polyethylene liners for the boxes you saved from last year. Now you know these locker containers are important in keeping your food right and each year something new is added. This year we think we hit the jackpot. This Flav-o-tainer Lok-R-Bag comes in pints, quarts and 2 1/2 quart size. It's a lined bag contraption that holds either liquids or solids. When yuh put liquid in it yuh seal it with a warm iron - and when yuh put solids in it all yuh gotta do is turn the flaps down. Outside of bein' so simple to use, it costs yuh so much cheaper. The pints cost \$1.00 fer 25 - the quarts cost \$1.25 fer 25 - and the 2 1/2 quart cost \$1.75 fer 25. The way we got it figured this new Lok-R-Bag is gonna save yuh both time and money - so somethin' new has really bin added this year. Come in and see it.

Fire Destroys Building Near Brown's Market

Fire completely destroyed an outbuilding behind Brown's Market at 734 Orchard Lake Road Saturday at 2:20 p.m. and threatened the market before it was brought under control. Northeast Township Fire Chief Roy Bell reported. Bell stated the building caught fire from burning grass. Speedy work by Northeast Township firemen prevented the flames from spreading to the market. Firemen estimated damage to the premises at \$600.
Two minor grass fires, one Saturday and the other Friday, were reported by the Northeast Township firemen. The Saturday grass fire was on Dunkirk and the grass fire Monday was at 21165 Hup. The four fires caused only minor damage.

Farmington H. S. Receives North Central Accreditation

G. V. Harrison, principal of the Farmington High School, reported Tuesday that word has been received from the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools that Farmington High School has been accredited by the association for the coming year.
The letter was signed by Dr. L. Vredevoe, state chairman of the North Central Association. Farmington High School has had a continuous accreditation from the North Central Association since 1927. Harrison stated that this means that credits of Farmington students will be acceptable in other high schools as well as colleges in the association.
The North Central Association is the largest and oldest such association in the country. It covers a total of 19 states. Approval of Farmington High School was made at the annual meeting of the association held in Chicago March 31 to April 4.

City To Begin Road Oiling Program Friday

James Tennant, City Manager, stated Tuesday that work will begin Friday on the oiling of gravel streets in the city.
He added that the bulk of the work will be done in the Floral Park section of the city where all of the streets are gravel surface. Other streets will include some in the Hutton subdivision and the alley entrance-way into the city parking lot running from Farmington Road west to the lot.
