Trojan Thinclads Defeat Inkster In School's First Track Victory

The Trojan thinclads defeated Inkster - Roosevelt 76 1/2 to 32 1/2 for the first track victory in the history of the school. All times and distances placed down in this meet are set as school track and field records.

Coach "Bud" Protterger's thinclads took full command of the meet from the very beginning to the end.

Joe Whyte, star track man for Clarencville, increased his scoring over his previous mark at Farmington. He led all his teammates in high point honor, scoring 17 1/2 points to boost his season mark to 33 1/2 points.

He was followed closely by Bill Myers, who scored 15 1/2 points.

In the first event, Joe Whyte won the high hurdles, setting the record at 19.3. He was followed closely by Richard Robenault, who placed second. Wilkins of Inkster-Roosevelt placed third.

The second event, the medley relay, was won by Clarencville in 10:10 with the team consisting of Don Hall, Ed Gilmore, Jim Galloway and Paul Vandenberg.

The 100 yard dash was won by Joe Whyte, who set a record of 10.9, followed by Bill Myers, second, and Jerry Alberts, third.

In the mile run, Leland Wilcox set the record at 5:55. Pette of Inkster placed second and Jerome Chappel placed third.

Paul Vandenberg won the quarter-mile dash with a time of 62.5. McElhannon of Inkster placed second and Lynn Seaton came in third.

The 150 yard hurdles event was won by Bill Myers in 23.6. Wilkins of Inkster placed second.

Spring Enrollment At MSC Is 12,467

Final spring term enrollment at Michigan State College totaled 12,467, according to Registrar Robert S. Linton.

Included in this total were 12,379 regular credit students and 88 agricultural short course enrollees. Regular students were divided into 8,414 men and 3,955 women.

The 12,467 total compares with an enrollment of 13,115 recorded during the spring term of 1951. Linton said the 1952 spring enrollment reflected the "natural" term-to-term drop from 13,593 in the fall term and 12,176 in the winter term of this year.
