**PLANNING LAMPREY INVENTORY IN STATE INLAND WATERS**  
 With peak lamprey runs expected in late May and early June, conservation department plan is to inventory inland waters where one or more lamprey species might be spawning or scattering fish.  
 Main objective is to determine whether or not the sea lamprey, Great Lakes fish menace in recent years, is becoming established in inland lakes. In past years some fishermen have mistaken other fish species, the brook, silver and chestnut lampreys, for the sea lamprey. The other three are not believed to be especially harmful to fish populations.  
 Fishermen can assist by reporting lampreys or possible lamprey-scattered fish to the nearest department representative or to Truman P. Guard, Grayling state fish hatchery. Anglers are advised that the sea lamprey is the larger of the four species, with the adult averaging about 18 inches in size. Some may be as long as 30 inches.  
 The department's fisheries research institute has a list of 150 lakes reported to possess the parasitic sea lamprey.  
 In Mullet lake, for example, the lamprey is believed to have migrated from Lake Huron by way of the Cheboygan river. Reaching the lake, the lamprey is suspected of moving into smaller tributary streams to spawn and then returning to Mullet where conditions may be satisfactory for it to remain and complete its life cycle. Movement pattern may be similar in other lakes.

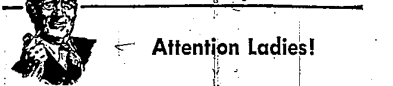

**From where I sit... by Joe Marsh**

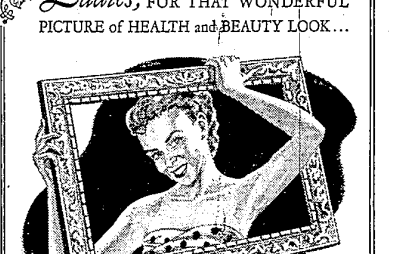


**Attention Ladies!**
