## AAUW Schedules Second Public Meeting On Library Situation

The Education Committee of the Farmington Branch of the American Association of University Women has issued invitations to all Farmington organizations to attend a second meeting to discuss the library situation. This meeting will be held on Wednesday, June 4, at 8 p.m. in Adams Hall, Universalist Church on Warner Street.

On April 30, representatives of

the majority of local organizations, met under the auspices of the A.A.U.W. of Farmington to learn about the possibility of a Community - Centered Library. These representatives urged that the A.A.U.W. sponsor a second meeting of all the representatives of groups in the area to take definite action toward the objective. They hope that a definite plan of action will be devised at this meeting. The groups will not be solicited for funds. The sole purpose of these meetings is to acquaint all residents of the area with the possibilities for library development.

Some statistics about the library and some of the city and township in relation to the library have been released. The city and township served by the library has a population of 13,509. The number of volumes in the library is 3,835 — this is 3/10 volume per capita. An adequate number of volumes should be 2 per capita or between 26,000 and 28,000 volumes. The registered borrowers number 1480 with a 12,783 circulation for 1951. Equalized valuation (Jan. 1952) is \$1,066. To qualify for State Aid the library should have 3/10 mill of the equalized valuation.

The library budget for 1951 was \$2,151. This is 16¢ per capita, \$1.50-\$3.00 per capita is the recommended budget — or about \$20,000. The total expenses of the library for 1951 were \$2,552 which included salaries, new books, and other expenses including insurance.
