(Continued from Page Two) ever, to get the equivalent of results through co-ordination of existing governmental agencies.

An illustration at point is Michigan's civil defense program, a new postwar activity of state government. Last year this department spent \$1,072,000, one million dollars of which went for blood typing. For this year's budget the governor asked \$3,000,000, a good 50 per cent more.

Gen. Lester J. Matland, civil defense director, has practically shelved ambitious plans to continue blood typing for an atomic disaster, expand the ground observer plan, buy fire trucks and medical supply trucks and set up special programs for key areas such as the Soil Locks.

By dire necessity he is now resorting to an appeal to existing state agencies for coordination. The health and highway departments, for example, are asked to help carry some of the load through their own manpower and funds.

Another illustration is the state department for economic development. Here is a super-chamber of commerce, fathered by former Governor Sizer, to help build business and industry in Michigan.

Government again intervened to supplant private leadership and private action, and all at the taxpayers' expense. The test of a new state agency, as we see it, is this: Is it needed? Can we afford it? Are we getting our money's worth?

A tax brevity: The state constitution says, in effect, that the legislature shall balance the budget. But Gov. Williams vetoed \$18,000,000 of the Republican \$28,500,000 program, creating a deficit of some \$20,000,000 to be tacked on to the \$55,000,000 accumulated deficit.

Who is now responsible for the unbalanced budget — Governor Williams or the Legislature?

Sen. Frank Andrews (R-Hillman) says, "My position is to veto no on any attempts to balance the budget. We did our legislative duty and the governor vetoed it. He won't get a chance to veto the beer tax, for it's not coming up."

Sen. Leo H. Roy (R-Hancock) said, "We won't solve any of our problems until we bounce Williams... he's just a jinx."

C. J. McNeill, legislative committee, says quietly, "They've authorized expenditures of more than \$30,000,000. That's law and you know it as well as I. Their only answer is to find more money — somewhere."

Governor Williams' solution is simple and familiar. Distribute the wealth by taxing employers' profits. FDR applied this principle of European socialism nearly 20 years ago. He called it the "New Deal."

A by-product of increased taxes and government spending, both impelled in part by the cost of World War II and the present cold war against communism, is inflation. "Socialism and inflation go hand in hand."

The average hourly rate of Detroit production workers last March was \$2.04. A 40-hour workweek meant earnings of \$81.60 — as an AVERAGE! That is inflation.

If further priming of the inflation pump is effected in 1952 under political direction, the illusion of good times will be even greater.

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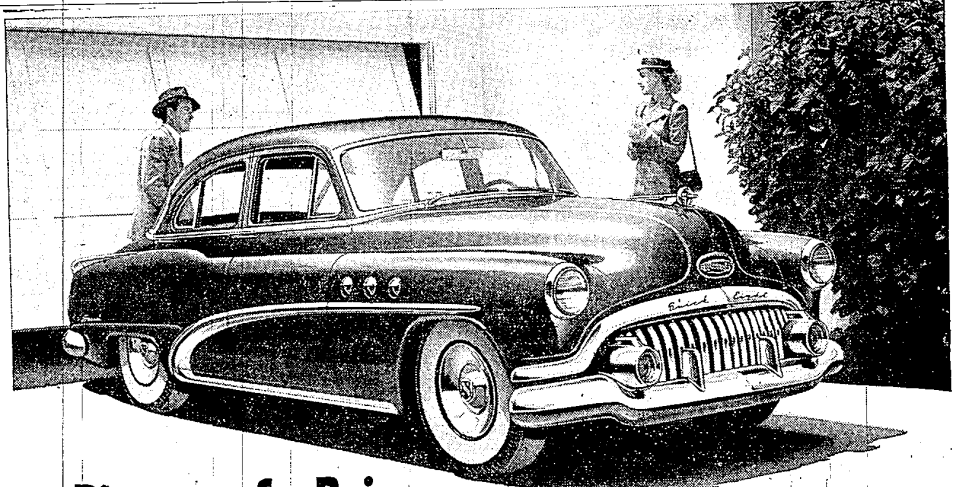
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
