In use in Farmington has increased from 2153 in 1945 to 4999 in January, 1952.
"Three more operator positions are currently being added to the existing twenty-one, bringing the total to twenty-four," Hartwick said. "This will result in faster answering and improved service on local calls as well as long distance calls," he said.
"Expanding telephone facilities cannot be a production line process like that in a manufacturing enterprise," Hartwick continued. "Each telephone installation involves problems peculiar to itself, no two being exactly alike. The type of telephone instrument, the distance from the central office, the type of wire used and the kind of service desired by each customer are just some of the factors to be engineered in meeting the service requirements of individual customers."
Each telephone must be connected to the central office by wires — wires from house to pole, then through a terminal into cable underground or overhead to the central office. Once in the central office the wires are continued through many items of equipment which make possible interconnection of each telephone to any one of thousands of others."
Michigan Bell engineers are planning new long range improvements in the extent and quality of telephone service for the citizens of Farmington, Hartwick indicated.

day sessions to all elementary schools to avoid excessive class loads.
"In June, 1951, voters made it possible to construct 24 new elementary classrooms and a new high school unit. With increased school enrollment there is expected to be a need of ten additional classrooms a year. By 1954 it is expected currently planned facilities will not be sufficient and some grades will have to be placed on half-day sessions.
"Such a picture may appear to be discouraging, the report continued. However, it is much better, school officials believe, to face facts than to adopt a "head in the sand" attitude and be caught with greatly increased enrollments and no plans for the emergency. The Board of Education and the people of this district have amply demonstrated that they prefer to know the problems confronting them."
