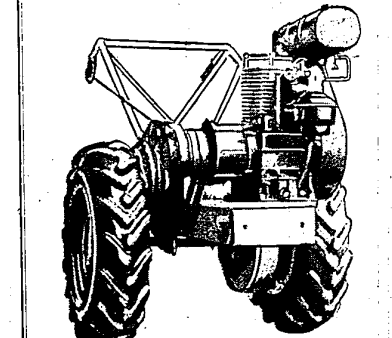

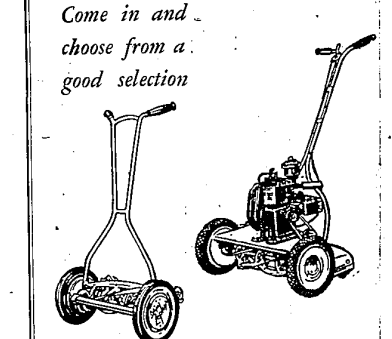

CIVILIAN DEFENSE SCHOOL OPENS IN DETROIT

A civil defense instructor school similar to the one attended by 295 representatives of industry, business firms, State and Federal agencies and civil defense groups, opened at Region 1 Headquarters in the Detroit Artillery Armory, 15000 West Eight Mile Road, on Tuesday, July 22. Classes will be held each Tuesday and Thursday from 10:00 a.m. until noon through Tuesday, August 12. The school, conducted by the Michigan Office of Civil Defense, the City of Detroit and other municipalities, is designed to provide training for key civil defense personnel which will qualify them to train volunteers in their own localities. The course will include 14 hours of basic instruction in various phases of Civil Defense, including outdoor demonstrations, upon completion of which a certificate will be awarded. Representatives of local schools, as well as civil defense personnel, are urged to attend.

NEED HOUSEHOLD GOODS TO EMPLOY HANDICAPPED

In order to maintain the record-breaking level of employment of physically handicapped men and women achieved in the past few months, Goodwill Industries of Detroit is seeking increased contributions of household discards. Collections of home discards last spring were the greatest in the entire history of the Goodwill Industries organization. As a result, it was possible to increase the number of handicapped on the Goodwill payroll.
With the slackening of housecleaning activities during the summer months, collections of household discards drop off. Eventually this will mean a reduction in Goodwill's work force. To prevent layoffs of handicapped workers, Goodwill Industries asks that housewives in this area make an effort to send in discards now. Items particularly needed are clothing of all types, shoes, hats, toys, furniture, small appliances and other household articles.

TOO MANY DRIVE SELVES TO DEATH, CHILDS ASSERTS

State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs appealed to Michigan motorists for more vigilance and less speed on the highways. Stressing the importance of speed control, which is the theme of a state-wide traffic safety campaign, he warned that many persons are being injured or killed by speeding themselves to death.
The speed control campaign was announced recently by the commissioner on behalf of the State Safety Commission, sponsor which asked the State Police to take the leadership. Municipal police, Sheriff's departments and others interested have pointed in giving the program vigorous promotional support.

"Speed control is more than a safe driving practice," Childs said. "It is a legal responsibility. Those who fail in their responsibility often lose their privilege to drive. Many lose their lives, too, the victims of their own recklessness. But frequently the innocent die."

During the last ten years 13,616 persons have been killed and 351,476 injured in Michigan traffic accidents. Nearly 25% of these accidents could have been avoided. A large percentage were due to excessive speed, the No. 1 killer on the highways.

Donald R. Layland Finishes Army School

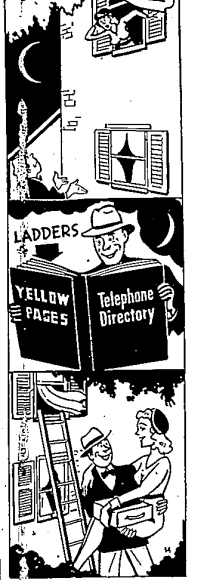

BEESKEEPERS MEET

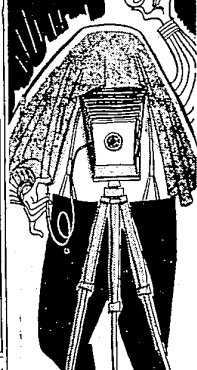
Two Michigan beekeepers association meetings are scheduled for late July, according to E. C. Martin, Michigan State College bee specialist.
