Waterfowl Production
Good As Last Year

Waterfowl production in Michigan compares favorably with last year, and may be slightly better. Conservation department reports that of breeding populations, nesting conditions and brood counts show overall good comparison with the last three years. Those years are considered good years of waterfowl production.

Breeding pairs this year were about equal to the average of earlier years, while the number of broods counted in sample check areas increased. Also, a good survival rate was noted among broods, though the size of broods dropped slightly from last year.

TO HOLD OPEN
HOUSE AT NEW
M. M. P. A. PLANT

Open house will be celebrated by the Michigan Milk Producers' Association on August 28 when its new milk receiving station and revamped manufacturing plant at Elsie, Michigan, will be viewed for the first time by Association members, milk producers shipping to the station, their neighbors and the public.

The plant, which recently was purchased by the Association from Elsie Cooperative Creamery Company, now includes a newly built, approved receiving station for acceptance of milk for the Detroit market and many producers in the area are meeting the Detroit standards so that they may share in the fluid milk sales in the metropolitan area.

Plans for the celebration provide for a picnic at noon with those attending bringing basket lunches and the Association providing milk and ice cream. The picnic will be held in the Elsie M. M. P. A. plant and tables will be arranged there or in the Elsie High School auditorium in case of bad weather.

Following the picnic, guests will inspect the plant and new facilities now provided. Chairman of the day is Paul Kennon, manager of the plant, while tables will be made by Ivan K. Maystead, president; Howard F. Simmons, secretary - manager, and William Gritov, treasurer of the Michigan Milk Producers' Association. The entertainment will feature the original Gold Dust Twins and musicians.

The new receiving station at Elsie increases the number of such stations owned and operated by M. M. P. A. members serving the Detroit market to nine, with a capacity to handle 1,200,000 pounds of fresh milk daily.
