Mr. and Mrs. George Elliot spent their summer vacation at a cottage in northern Michigan with their two children.

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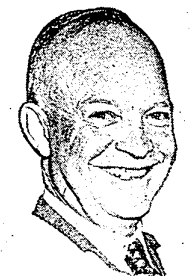
