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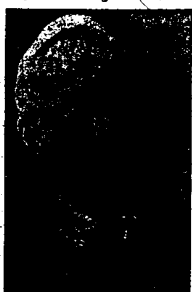

Cars arrive in Pontiac at 6:55 a. m. and hourly until 12:55 a. m.
