Grocers Required To Post Ceiling Prices

Ceiling prices for the 400 food items that southeastern Michigan residents buy most frequently were displayed in every grocery store in the area September 29, in plain view of the customers, Michigan OPS District Director Robert M. Warren said this week.

These dollar-and-cent ceilings, part of the OPS Community Ceiling Program, make it possible for consumers to tell by glancing at the poster in the store what the ceilings are on such staple foods as flour, rice, coffee and lard and such standard items as butter, cheese, cereals and baby food.

Social Security Changes Listed

Changes made recently in the social security law have special importance for minor children of men who died in military service after September 16, 1947, according to Rex A. C. Atwood, manager of the Pontiac social security office.

Until the new law was passed service in World War II could count toward social security payments but service after the end of World War II did not. The new law extends the social security credit to cover military or naval service after the end of the war, so that now service at any time from September 16, 1940, to December 31, 1953, may count toward benefits. This gives insurance protection to the survivors of our service men who died in the present Korean conflict.

Children are not the only dependents who may get monthly payments, Atwood pointed out — widows over 65, and widows under 65 with minor children in their care may also be entitled to them. Dependent parents may be eligible if the serviceman is not survived by a widow or child.

Social security credits for military service after the end of World War II will be used in figuring monthly benefits beginning this month. They will not count toward lump-sum death payments where death occurred before September, 1952.

Atwood suggests that some member of the family inquire at the social security office about the social security account of every deceased veteran or serviceman who had military service after July, 1947, and is survived by a widow, child or dependent parent. 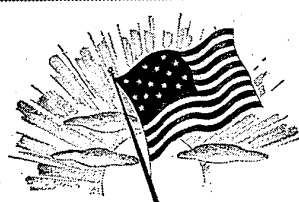

Stabilization Offices Altered By Budget

Michigan employers and unions are reminded that after September 30 the Regional Wage Stabilization Board staff at Detroit will provide the WSB information and advisory services formerly provided by the Department of Labor's Wage and Hour Division. Since October 1 all petitions for wage adjustments, requests for rulings and interpretations, letters of general inquiry, and requests for regulations, forms, or printed matter will be sent to the WSB office at 316 E. Jefferson, Detroit 26.

Similarly, employers and union representatives seeking advice on wage stabilization matters either by telephone or personal conference will be required to consult the Detroit WSB staff. The telephone number is W0odward 2-6236.
